## **Preparation of the Gifts**

At Mass, members of the faithful bring forward the offerings of bread and wine that will become the body and blood of Christ.

"It is a praiseworthy practice for the bread and wine to be presented by the faithful. ... Even though the faithful no longer bring from their own possessions the bread and wine intended for the liturgy as was once the case, nevertheless the rite of carrying up the offerings still keeps its spiritual efficacy and significance" (General Instruction of the Roman Missal, no. 73).

The bread and wine represent the sacrifice of people's lives offered in union with the sacrifice of Christ in the Mass, as expressed by the prayers at the Preparation of the Gifts: "the bread we offer you: fruit of the earth and work of human hands... the wine we offer you: fruit of the vine and work of human hands."

# CHILDREN & YOUTH

## **Empowering God's Children**

As caring adults, we are responsible for ensuring the safety of children and young people. The prevention of child sexual abuse requires more than adult awareness, education, and training. It is also imperative to give children and young people tools to keep them safe. These tools include education about boundaries, safe and unsafe behaviors, and healthy relationships.

To empower children and young people in these ways, age-appropriate lessons are taught each fall to students enrolled in catechesis (religious education), from kindergarten to 12<sup>th</sup> grade. Parents can receive these lessons upon request and can have their children opt out of these classes. For more information, please contact Joy Weir (jweir@richmondcathedral.org).

## **Infant Baptism**

The first sacrament is the foundation of being a Christian. Baptism, according to the literal meaning of the term, is an "immersion" into the death and resurrection of Christ that shapes all of life: it forgives sins, it makes one son or daughter of God, and it joins one to the Church.

Children are baptized within the first weeks of life, if possible. A class is provided to help parents understand the grace and responsibilities of this sacrament. Baptisms are celebrated year-round at the Cathedral and can be conveniently scheduled. For more information, contact Joy Weir (jweir@richmondcathedral.org).

## First Penance and First Holy Communion

First Holy Communion normally takes place when a child is seven years old and in second grade. It is preceded by the sacrament of Penance.

To receive First Penance and First Holy Communion, a child must already be baptized in the Catholic Church and enrolled in catechesis (home, parish, or Catholic school). Several preparation sessions are also required.

Preparation for First Penance takes place in January and preparation for First Holy Communion takes place in April. If you have questions on preparing your child for his or her sacraments, please contact Joy Weir (<a href="mailto:jweir@richmondcathedral.org">jweir@richmondcathedral.org</a>).

### Youth Confirmation

Confirmation for young people is normally received at age fifteen and in 10<sup>th</sup> grade. This sacrament is a special outpouring of the Holy Spirit that strengthens a person to live out the Catholic faith. To be confirmed, a young person must already be baptized in the Catholic Church and enrolled in catechesis (home, parish, or Catholic school). Preparation sessions (September–May) are also required. ## **Becoming a Catholic: OCIA**

The official name of the catechumenate is being changed from the *Rite* of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) to the *Order* of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA). The catechumenate is the process for entering the Catholic Church.

This change in terminology reflects a more accurate translation of the Latin name for the catechumenate (*Ordo initiationis christianae adultorum*). "Order" designates a collection of rites marking the various stages and circumstances of the catechumenate.

The Order of Christian Initiation of Adults includes four groups of people: unbaptized adults, unbaptized children above the age of seven, those baptized in another Christian denomination, and Catholics who did not receive instruction in the faith and seek the sacraments of Confirmation and/or First Holy Communion.

### **OCIA Meals**

Each OCIA session begins with a meal provided by our parishioners. Sharing a meal together creates a faith community, where people come to learn about the Catholic faith. ## **Receiving Holy Communion**

The National Eucharistic Revival seeks to help American Catholics deepen their devotion to the Eucharist. Catholics are obligated to attend Mass on Sundays and on holy days of obligation but are not obligated to receive Holy Communion (*Code of Canon Law*, canon 1247).

The Church urges the faithful to receive Holy Communion as frequently as possible, if they are properly disposed (Instruction on Eucharistic Worship, *Eucharisticum mysterium*, no. 37). The proper disposition includes fasting from food and drink (except for water and medicine) for one hour prior to receiving the Eucharist (canon 919 §1). A person aware of having committed a grave (mortal) sin must first confess his or her sins in the sacrament of Penance before receiving Holy Communion (canon 916).

# **Precepts of the Church**

The precepts or obligations of the Catholic Church are "meant to guarantee to the faithful the very necessary minimum in the spirit of prayer and moral effort, in the growth in love of God and neighbor" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 2041). The precepts are these: (1) attend Mass each Sunday and holy day of obligation; (2) confess one's sins at least once a year; (3) receive Holy Communion at least once a year, during the Easter season; (4) observe days of fasting and abstinence; and (5) assist with the material needs of the Church, according to one's ability; and (6) to observe the marriage laws of the Church (nos. 2042–2043).
