

"The Surging Joy which Moves Me": A Holy Hour in Commemoration of the North American Martyrs

Tuesday, October 15 | 6:00-7:00 pm

Each month, a holy hour takes place that includes Exposition of the Most Holy Eucharist, Scripture readings, sacred music, silent prayer, and benediction. The holy hour is a way to deepen one's love and appreciation for the Eucharist, which is Christ himself.

This month's holy hour will focus the North American Martyrs: Sts. John de Brébeuf, Isaac Jogues, and their companions, whose feast day is October 19. These six French Jesuit priests and two religious brothers evangelized the Huron tribes; they were later killed by the Iroquois between 1642 and 1649 in present-day Canada and New York state. Fr. John de Brébeuf expressed, movingly, a desire for martyrdom in his diary: "My beloved Jesus, and because of the surging joy which moves me, here and now I offer my blood and body and life."

Eucharistic Adoration

The worship of the Most Blessed Sacrament outside of Mass, usually when it is exposed on the altar, is called Eucharistic adoration. This worship of the Eucharist flows from Mass and leads back to it.

"Exposition of the Most Holy Eucharist... encourages the acknowledgement of Christ's wonderful presence in and invites us to a union of heart with him that reaches its summit in sacramental Communion" (Holy Communion and Worship of the Eucharistic Mystery outside Mass, no. 82).

Notes from the Choir Loft

The music of Olivier Messiaen (1908–1992) is usually an acquired taste, since it is rhythmically complex in addition to being harmonically and melodically unique. A musical prodigy, Messiaen entered the Paris Conservatory at age 11 and immediately began study with composer Paul Dukas (who wrote *The Sorcerer's Apprentice*, made famous by the Disney movie *Fantasia*). A devout Catholic, Messiaen was the organist at Paris' *Eglise Sainte-Trinité*, a post he held for 61 years until his death. The Cathedral Choir performs *O Sacrum Convivium* (O Sacred Banquet), which employs a rich, chordal texture suggesting an incredible sweetness: a sweetness that comes from the Most Blessed Sacrament.

Last Week in Catechesis

In the Good Shepherd Atrium (grades PREK-1) a focal point is the prayer table. A prayer table can also be a place that lives at the heart of the family home. The table has the Bible, a candle, a prayer card and a cloth. As part of his or her work, the child may not only prepare, but also care for the prayer table. Children will carefully place items on the prayer table, including flower arrangements that they create themselves. Anointing of the Sick

"The sacrament of Anointing of the Sick has as its purpose the conferral of a special grace on the Christian experiencing the difficulties inherent in the condition of grave illness or old age" (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, no. 1527).

The Anointing of the Sick should be administered when someone becomes seriously ill or weak because of old age; the sacrament should not be delayed until the verge of death. A person may also be anointed in the case of a mental illness or before surgery, if the reason for the surgery is a serious condition or if the person is elderly. The sacrament may also be received if a person recovers from an illness and falls ill again, or if the same illness worsens (*Pastoral Care of the Sick: Rites of Anointing and Viaticum*, nos. 9–11, 53).
