Mary, the Holy Mother of God

Tuesday, December 31 | Vigil Mass: 6:00 pm Wednesday, January 1 | Mass: 12:00 N

The Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God is the octave (eighth) day of Christmas. This feast commemorates the motherhood of Mary and naming of Christ at his circumcision: "Mary kept all these things, reflecting on them in her heart. ... When eight days were completed for his circumcision, he was named Jesus, the name given him by the angel before he was conceived in the womb" (Luke 2:19, 21).

The Cathedral has a Christmas wish: an increase in weekly contributions. The parish currently has a cash shortfall of \$80,000 for the fiscal year. This situation reflects the trend of falling income compounded by rising prices. During the Christmas season, parishioners are kindly asked to consider increasing their contributions to help cover this deficit, as expenses have already been significantly reduced. A weekly average of \$18,500 is needed to cover normal operating expenses. The generosity of parishioners is appreciated.

Rectory Open House January 5 | 12:00 N

Parishioners are invited to an open house at the Cathedral rectory following the $11:00\,\mathrm{M}$ Mass. The rectory is the red-brick house located across the street from the church (16 N. Laurel St.), at the corner of N. Laurel St. and S. Cathedral Pl. (Floyd Ave.). The open house will be a memorable way for the parish to celebrate the Epiphany, the feast when homes are customarily blessed.

Free Parking

WORSHIP

Loving Mother of the Redeemer

There are five antiphons sung in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary that correspond to the various liturgical seasons. The antiphon sung during Advent and Christmas, until the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord (February 2), is the Alma Redemptoris Mater (Loving Mother of the Redeemer). Parishioners may wish to use this antiphon as devotional prayer during Advent:

Loving Mother of the Redeemer, gate of heaven, star of the sea, assist your people who have fallen yet strive to rise again. To the wonderment of nature you bore your Creator, yet remained a virgin after as before. You who received Gabriel's joyful greeting, have pity on us poor sinners.

Notes from the Choir Loft

Locus Iste ("This place was made by God") by Austrian composer Anton Bruckner (1824–1896) is the most famous settings of this text, typically used during the dedication or anniversary of churches. It was commissioned by the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Linz. Found in the Roman Gradual, the words are inspired by the stories of Jacob's ladder (Genesis 28:16) and Moses's encounter with the burning bush (Exodus 3:5).

Cathedral Foundation Organ Campaign Turning "Pipe" Dreams Into Reality

The Cathedral's new gallery pipe organ is regarded as one of the finest in the Americas. It has already been featured on NPR's "Pipedreams" (hosted by Michael Barone); it will be the featured cover story of the January issue of the *American Guild of Organists* magazine; and recordings will be made on it this spring and summer, including a thorough demonstration on YouTube, an improvisation album by the Cathedral organist, and a full-length recording by the first-prize winner of the 2024 AGO National Organ Competition.

THE EUCHARIST: OUR TREASURE

"The tabernacle was first intended for the reservation of the Eucharist in a worthy place so that it could be brought to the sick and those absent outside of Mass. As faith in the real presence of Christ in his Eucharist deepened, the Church became conscious of the meaning of silent adoration of the Lord present under the Eucharistic species. It is for this reason that the tabernacle should be located in an especially worthy place in the church and should be constructed in such a way that it emphasizes and manifests the truth of the real presence of Christ in the Blessed Sacrament."

Infant Baptism

The first sacrament is the foundation of being a Christian. Baptism, according to the literal meaning of the term, is an "immersion" into the death and resurrection of Christ that shapes all of life: it forgives sins, it makes one son or daughter of God, and it joins one to the Church.

Children are baptized within the first weeks of life, if possible. A class is provided to help parents understand the grace and responsibilities of this sacrament. First Penance and First Holy Communion

First Holy Communion normally takes place when a child is seven years old and in second grade. It is preceded by the sacrament of Penance. To receive First Penance and First Holy Communion, a child must already be baptized in the Catholic Church and enrolled in catechesis (home, parish, or Catholic school). Several preparation sessions are also required. Preparation for First Penance takes place in January and preparation for First Holy Communion takes place in April. Pilgrims of Hope

"Hope does not disappoint' (Rom 5:5). In the spirit of hope, the Apostle Paul addressed these words of encouragement to the Christian community of Rome. Hope is also the central message of the coming Jubilee that, in accordance with an ancient tradition, the Pope proclaims every twenty-five years. ... For everyone, may the Jubilee be a moment of genuine, personal encounter with the Lord Jesus, the 'door' (cf. Jn 10:7, 9) of our salvation, whom the Church is charged to proclaim always, everywhere and to all as 'our hope' (1 Tim 1:1)" (Bull of Indiction of the Jubilee Year, *Spes non confundit*, no. 1).

Becoming a Catholic: A Journey of Faith

Are you or anyone you know interested in becoming a Catholic? The Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA) is a process for learning about the Catholic faith. Sessions focus on Catholic teachings, scripture reflections, faith sharing, prayer, and worship. This spiritual journey is for adults who have not been baptized, those who have been baptized in another denomination, and adults who were baptized Catholic but did not receive instruction in the faith. Catechesis

Catechesis designates religious education. The term is derived from the Greek *eche* (echo), in the sense of the Catholic faith "resounding" by means of instruction. Religious education is available for all ages: children, youth, and adult.

Pope St. John Paul II taught that, "The definitive aim of catechesis is to put people not only in touch but in communion, in intimacy, with Jesus Christ: only He can lead us to the love of the Father in the Spirit and make us share in the life of the Holy Trinity" (*Catechesi tradendae*, no. 5 §3).
