

# Baptism of the Lord

Jesus' baptism in the Jordan River at the hands of St. John the Baptist reveals that he is the Son of God: "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased" (Matthew 3:17). For this reason, the Baptism of the Lord is traditionally reckoned as the second of three epiphanies (manifestations) and is therefore included in the Christmas season. The other epiphanies are the visit of the Magi (Matthew 2:1–12), and the changing of water into wine at the wedding feast of Cana (John 2:1–11). Christ's baptism also prefigures his passion, death, and resurrection (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, no. 1224).

#### **Christmas Echo**

The *Alma Redemptoris Mater* (Loving Mother of the Redeemer) is one of five antiphons in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary sung according to the various liturgical seasons. This first antiphon is sung from the First Sunday of Advent until the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord (February 2). This feast marks the fortieth day after Christmas and commemorates the dedication of the Christ child in the Jerusalem Temple (Luke 2:22–38).

### Crèche

The manger scene in the St. Vincent de Paul chapel will remain in place until the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord (February 2).

Although the Christmas season ends on the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord (this year, January 12), the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord marks the fortieth day after Christmas, when Christ was presented in the Jerusalem Temple (Luke 2:22–38). The presence of the crèche until that time will help us commemorate this event associated with Christ's nativity.

## Notes from the Choir Loft

The energetic setting of the traditional Church Slavonic *Bogoróditse Djévo, radujsa* (Rejoice, O Virgin Mary) by Estonian composer Arvo Pärt (b. 1935) was commissioned by King's College Choir (Cambridge, England) and premiered at their famed Lessons and Carols in 1990. Its buoyant vibrancy contrasts with typically lyrical settings found in Latin *Ave Maria* compositions. The brevity of the piece is marked by a singular joy.

## Cathedral Foundation Organ Campaign Turning "Pipe" Dreams Into Reality

This weekend, the weather forecast for the Church is the Baptism of the Lord with a guarantee of thunderous organ. When the cantor sings the text "The voice of the Father thundered:," the organist will depress the *l'orage* (storm) lever. This simple but effective device plays the eight lowest notes of the organ in a cluster, resulting in the sound of rolling thunder. It can also be depressed rhythmically, which mimics the sound of bass drums.

#### Lectors

Parishioners are welcome to serve as lectors at Sunday Mass. Lectors must be baptized Catholics, have received their First Holy Communion, attend Mass each Sunday and holy days of obligation, and, if married, be married in the Catholic Church.

The ministry of lector is also open to young people who are at least in the 6<sup>th</sup> grade, and who are enrolled in a Catholic school or religious education program.

The *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* states that lectors should be "people who are truly suited to carrying out this function and carefully prepared, so that by their hearing the readings from the sacred texts the faithful may conceive in their hearts a sweet and living affection for Sacred Scripture" (no. 101). Parents seeking baptism for their child(ren) ages 0–6 are invited to a short information session in the Parish Hall. The presentation will review the steps involved in having a child baptized and a tour of the church.

Baptism is the first sacrament and the foundation of being a Christian. According to the literal meaning of the term, baptism is an "immersion" into the death and resurrection of Christ that shapes all of life: it forgives sins, it makes one son or daughter of God, and it joins one to the Church.

First Holy Communion normally takes place when a child is seven years old and in second grade. It is preceded by the sacrament of Penance. To receive First Penance and First Holy Communion, a child must already be baptized in the Catholic Church and enrolled in catechesis (home, parish, or Catholic school). Several preparation sessions are also required.

## Jubilee 2025

## Pilgrims of Hope

There is an indulgence associated with the Jubilee Year. An indulgence is one way to cleanse the "residue" of sin that remains after sins have been forgiven in the sacrament of Penance: "'Every sin... entails an unhealthy attachment to creatures, which must be purified either here on earth, or after death, in the state called Purgatory.' In our humanity, weak and attracted by evil, certain residual effects of sin remain. These are removed by the indulgence" (*Spes non confundit*, no. 23 §3).

The jubilee indulgence can be gained by venerating the jubilee Cross and reciting the jubilee prayer at the Cathedral, or by carrying out works of mercy for those in need, including the sick and disabled. The usual conditions for an indulgence must also be fulfilled: confessing one's sins, receiving Holy Communion, and praying for the pope's intention (listed in the bulletin).

## **Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA)**

How can parishioners be involved? The whole parish represents the Chruch, and journeys with the members of OCIA. OCIA members are seeking to know Christ: "Reflecting upon the value of the Paschal Mystery and renewing their own conversion lead them by their own example to obey the Holy Spirit more generously". All parishioners play a role in the OCIA ministry through prayer, being a sponsor, and providing a meal for an OCIA session.
