# Epiphany House Blessing 20+C+M+B+25

It is customary to bless homes on the Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord, since this feast commemorates the visit of the Magi to Christ's "home" in Bethlehem (Matthew 2:1–12). The blessing of homes typically includes writing, in chalk, the following inscription above the front door: **20+C+M+B+25**. The numbers 2025 indicate the year.

According to Scripture, the Magi were astrologers (Matthew 2:1–2, 7), and ancient calendars were based on astronomical phenomena. The letters CMB stand for the traditional names given to the Three Kings: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar. CMB is also an acronym for the Latin phrase *Christus mansionem benedicat*: "May Christ bless this house."

The traditional date for the feast of the Epiphany is January 6 (which follows the twelfth day of Christmas). In the United States, however, Epiphany is observed on the Sunday between January 2 and 8. A text for the blessing of homes is included in the bulletin.

### Confirmation January 4 | 5:00 pm Mass

Congratulations to Angelica O'Neill on receiving the sacrament of Confirmation.

"It is called *Confirmation* because it confirms and strengthens baptismal grace" (*Compendium to the Catechism of the Catholic Church*, no. 266). Furthermore, "The effect of Confirmation is a special outpouring of the Holy Spirit like that of Pentecost. ...It roots the recipient more deeply in divine sonship, binds him more firmly to Christ and to the Church and reinvigorates the gifts of the Holy Spirit in his soul. It gives a special strength to witness to the Christian faith" (no. 268).

Parishioners are invited to an open house at the Cathedral rectory following the 11:00 M Mass. The rectory is the red-brick house located across the street from the church (16 N. Laurel St.), at the corner of N. Laurel St. and S. Cathedral Pl. (Floyd Ave.). The open house will be a memorable way for the parish to celebrate the Epiphany, the feast when homes are customarily blessed.

# WORSHIP

### **Christmas Season**

Christmas is its own a liturgical season, which extends beyond the Octave of Christmas. Christmas Time, as this period is officially called, includes the Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord (January 7), and ends with the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord (January 8).

### **Epiphany of the Lord**

Today is the Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord. This feast commemorates the visit of the Magi, when Christ was revealed as the Savior of all peoples (Matthew 2:1–12).

### Announcement of Easter

According to the *Roman Missal*, "On the Epiphany of the Lord, after the singing of the Gospel, a Deacon or cantor, in keeping with an ancient practice of Holy Church, announces from the ambo the moveable feasts of the current year" (Appendix I: Various Chants for the Order of Mass, The Announcement of Easter and the Moveable Feasts).

Perhaps the custom of announcing the date of Easter and the other feasts on Epiphany arose because the Magi were astrologers (Matthew 2:1–2, 7), and ancient calendars were based on celestial events.

### Notes from the Choir Loft

The text of *Magi Videntes Stellam* (The Magi having seen the star) is taken from the antiphon to the *Magnificat* at First Vespers for Epiphany. Its composer, Jacob Clemens non Papa (ca. 1510–1556), composed in the polyphonic (multi-voiced) style of his day, but did so without study in Italy, which was a norm. His name (*non Papa*: not the pope) distinguished him from another famous Clement: Pope Clement VII (r. 1523–1534).

### Cathedral Foundation Organ Campaign Turning "Pipe" Dreams Into Reality

The Conference of Roman Catholic Cathedral Musicians (CRCCM) will hold their annual colloquium at the Cathedral this upcoming week. The new pipe organ serves as the focus of the week, as members hear about the process of going through a successful project, experience an organ concert, and get a behind-the-scenes peek at the instrument's structure. This is the first time the Cathedral has hosted this conference.

### **Infant Baptism**

The first sacrament is the foundation of being a Christian. Baptism, according to the literal meaning of the term, is an "immersion" into the death and resurrection of Christ that shapes all of life: it forgives sins, it makes one son or daughter of God, and it joins one to the Church.

Children are baptized within the first weeks of life, if possible. A class is provided to help parents understand the grace and responsibilities of this sacrament. ### First Penance and First Holy Communion

First Holy Communion normally takes place when a child is seven years old and in second grade. It is preceded by the sacrament of Penance. To receive First Penance and First Holy Communion, a child must already be baptized in the Catholic Church and enrolled in catechesis (home, parish, or Catholic school). Several preparation sessions are also required. Preparation for First Penance takes place in January and preparation for First Holy Communion takes place in April. ### Jubilee 2025 Pilgrims of Hope

Last Saturday's Opening of the Jubilee Year Mass (December 28) included the veneration of a Cross. According to jubilee norms, that Cross will remain in the sanctuary throughout the year so that the faithful can venerate it. Parishioners are encouraged to pray the Jubilee prayer that has been placed near the Cross.

"This is the sign of the journey of hope of the pilgrim people behind the cross of Christ, as evidenced in the Jubilee logo: 'In a world in which progress and regression are intertwined, the Cross of Christ remains the anchor of salvation: a sign of hope that does not disappoint because it is founded on the love of God, merciful and faithful" (Pope Francis, September 21, 2022).

### Becoming a Catholic: A Journey of Faith

Are you or anyone you know interested in becoming a Catholic? The Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA) is a process for learning about the Catholic faith. Sessions focus on Catholic teachings, scripture reflections, faith sharing, prayer, and worship. This spiritual journey is for adults who have not been baptized, those who have been baptized in another denomination, and adults who were baptized Catholic but did not receive instruction in the faith. Adults who are open to discerning their personal experience of faith and learning more about the Catholic Church are welcome to OCIA.
