Consistent modest contributions enable the Cathedral to pay for normal operating expenses (payroll, utilities, insurance). There are 1,229 registered families in the parish. If each registered household blessed the Cathedral with an extra \$10 a week during April, the parish would be able to meet its current offertory deficit. The goal is to collect, on average, \$18,500 per week to meet budgeted expenses. Thank you for your generosity.

# **Annual Diocesan Appeal**

This annual collection is ongoing. The Cathedral's goal during this Jubilee Year is \$58,940 (out of a total diocesan target of \$4,676,409). The parish receives back 20% of the funds received up to the goal (\$11,788), and 50% of the funds above the goal. Last year, the Cathedral received back \$33,051. Use the QR code to donate. # **Baptism**

Baptism

Congratulations to Joseph William Paul Flythe, who was baptized last Saturday.

This first sacrament is the foundation of being a Christian. Baptism, according to the literal meaning of the term, is an "immersion" into the death and resurrection of Christ that shapes all of life: it forgives sins, it makes one son or daughter of God, and it joins one to the Church (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, nos. 1213–1214, 1262–1263, 1265, 1267).

# Laetare Sunday

#### March 30

The Fourth Sunday of Lent is traditionally known as *Laetare* Sunday. The name is derived from the Entrance Antiphon (Introit) assigned to today's Mass: "Rejoice [Latin: *Laetare*] Jerusalem, and all who love her. Be joyful, all who were in mourning; exult and be satisfied at her consoling breast" (Isaiah 66:10–11).

Roughly the midway point of Lent, today comes a respite from the penitential rigors of the season: rose-colored vestments may be worn, instrumental music may be played, and flowers adorn the sanctuary. Therefore, the theme of *Laetare* Sunday is joy.

# Second Scrutiny in Preparation for Adult Baptism March 30 | 11:00 am Mass

The scrutinies are special prayers offered for the elect, that is, adults preparing to receive the sacraments of Christian Initiation—Baptism, Confirmation, and the Eucharist—at Easter. Being penitential rites, the scrutinies, "have a double purpose... namely to reveal what is weak, sick and sinful in the hearts of the elect so that it can be haled; and what is honorable, strong and holy, so that it can be strengthened" (Order of Christian Initiation of Adults, no. 141).

The scrutinies take place on the Third, Fourth, and Fifth Sundays of Lent. According to the Church's ancient tradition, these rites are linked to specific Gospel readings that develop the themes of purification and enlightenment, which are the focus of the elect's final preparation. For this reason, the Church successively reads the stories of the woman at the well (John 4:5–42), the man born blind (John 9:1–41), and the raising of Lazarus (John 11:1–45) when the scrutinies are celebrated.

### Notes from the Choir Loft

English composer Richard Farrant (ca. 1525–1580) enjoyed the support and patronage of Queen Mary I. Due to his extensive experience as a theater composer, in addition to his duties at the Royal Chapel, Farrant sensitively sets text to music. His brief work "Call to Remembrance" (Psalm 25) employs restrained trumpet calls at the beginning, contrasting with stylistic changes throughout to illustrate each strophe of the text.

## Cathedral Foundation Organ Campaign Turning "Pipe" Dreams Into Reality

"There's a thunderstorm outside—but the sun's out?!" "I'm pretty sure that it came from the organ." "No! No! Didn't you hear the thunder?!" This was the exchange between two spouses during last week's Gospel Acclamation, "From the shining cloud the Father's voice was heard." The wanted effect was intentional. The new organ has a storm (French: <code>orage</code>) lever. Depressing this lever with low-pitched pedal stops drawn creates the effect of rolling thunder.

### Pilgrims of Hope

"What is the happiness that we await and desire? Not some fleeting pleasure, a momentary satisfaction that, once experienced, keeps us longing for more, in a desperate quest that leaves our hearts unsated and increasingly empty. We aspire to a happiness that is definitively found in the one thing that can bring us fulfilment, which is love. ... Let us listen once more to the words of the Apostle: 'I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord' (Romans 8:38–39)" (Bull of Indiction of the Jubilee Year, *Spes non confundit*, no. 21 §2).

The Jubilee Cross will remain in the sanctuary throughout the year so that the faithful can venerate it. Parishioners are encouraged to pray the Jubilee prayer that has been placed near the Cross

### **Abstinence during Lent**

Catholic ages 14 and older are obliged to abstain from eating meat on the Fridays of Lent (*Code of Canon Law*, canons 1251–1252). Expectant and nursing mothers, and those who are ill, are dispensed from the obligation of abstinence.

### Pro Populo Mass

The Mass is a sacrifice because it renews the sacrifice of Christ's death and resurrection (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, no. 1366). The grace of this sacrifice can be applied to a person or group or group of people, living or deceased. According to Church law, at least one Sunday Mass (celebrated on Sunday or anticipated on Saturday evening) must be offered "for the people" (in Latin: *pro populo*) (*Code of Canon Law*, canons 388, 534).

### Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA)

How can parishioners be involved? The whole parish represents the Chruch, and journeys with the members of OCIA. OCIA members are seeking to know Christ: "Reflecting upon the value of the Paschal Mystery and renewing their own conversion lead them by their own example to obey the Holy Spirit more generously". All parishioners play a role in the OCIA ministry through prayer, being a sponsor, and providing a meal for an OCIA session.



Dear Cathedral Parishioners,

I want to let you know that the rectory backyard is being fixed up. This project will mark the completion of the rectory renovation. (The rectory is the brick house directly across the street from the Cathedral, at the corner N. Laurel St. and S. Cathedral Pl. / Floyd Ave.).

I moved into the rectory in November 2022 and am grateful to live in this historic house that is conveniently located next to the church. The Diocese of Richmond generously paid for the interior and exterior renovation of the rectory building, and the Cathedral parish pays no rent to the diocese.

As with the Cathedral's previous rectories, the parish is responsible for furnishing the house and paying for utilities, insurance, capital expenditures, and landscaping. The work now underway in the backyard will make that space more usable and will provide privacy and security. The scope of the project includes the installation of lattice panels, pavers, fencing, and a statue of the Virgin Mary.

The parish finance council approved the expenditure of \$118,000 for this project after reviewing multiple bids. The cost reflects recent price increases for materials and labor. Rosete Hardscapes, a local company, is carrying out the work.

The backyard renovation will be completed around Easter. I invite you to a reception there on May 4 at 12:00 N (following the 11:00 am Mass). This gathering will be an opportunity for us to enjoy the space.

I would like to thank the parish finance council for its assistance with this project. I also thank you for your continued support of the parish.

I wish you a holy Lent and a happy Easter.

### **FASTING**

Days of Abstinence: No meat may be eaten on Ash Wednesday (March 5), the Fridays of Lent, and Good Friday (April 18). This norm applies to Catholics 14 and older.

Days of Fasting: Only one full meal is permitted on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday for Catholics between 18 and 59. Two small meals should not equal a second full meal. Coffee, tea, or water beween meals is allowed.
